The mile-deep gorge made by the Blue Nile as it flows out of the highlands of North West Ethiopia into the broad plains of the Sudan is one of the greatest natural features of the world. It remained virtually unexplored until 1968, when a British expedition set out to navigate 500 miles of the crocodile infested river -known in Ethiopia as the Great Abbai.

Despite the harsh conditions experienced including two attacks by bandits in the Northern Gorge, a group of scientists mainly zoologists -were able to carry out a valuable scientific investigation of the area.
