

Guildford Travel Club has members all over the county and celebrates its 50th anniversary in April. Chairman Janet Parsons, who lives in Grayshott, tells us more.


or me travel is about journeys. The excitement of setting out in the early hours to drive across Europe in an old VW Beetle in my early 20s and seeing snow-capped mountains for the first time as we crossed the Alps is an experience I'll never forget.

Sailing in the Greek islands and watching a strip of intense golden light as the sun rose over the giant volcanic cliffs of the island of Thira, crossing the Arctic Circle to the beautiful Lofoten Islands or visiting the wonderful legacy of ancient sites in Europe and North Africa. The urge to go on exploring is born out of such experiences.

In April we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the journey

of Guildford Travel Club. Founded in 1966 the driving force behind the club was Bay Hyde, well known in Guildford for her involvement in numerous local organisations. She inspired the newly formed committee to organise a regular programme of illustrated travel talks and a range of social activities with the underpinning motto of 'Travel for Travel's Sake'. In just over a year membership reached nearly 200.

Such was the popularity of the club it hosted a major event in 1970 at the Civic Hall, with mountaineer Chris Bonnington speaking on his expedition which made the first ascent of the South Face of Annapurna, the biggest and most difficult climb in the Himalaya at the time.





Guildford Travel Club is the leading travel club in South-East England and has gained an enviable reputation for the quality of its speakers, including distinguished photographers and writers from all over the UK. The club has welcomed Ranulph Fiennes, Viscount Norwich, Felicity Aston, and John Blashford Snell, a great explorer and former president of the club, among others.

One of the great attractions of Guildford Travel Club is its welcoming atmosphere. Members and visitors alike come to hear enthusiastic and inspirational speakers and also to share their own travel experiences and discuss future travel plans.
